



## **Syllabus for History of Greek and Roman Civilization**

**Credit Hours 3**

**HIST1421**

### ***Course Description***

This course explores the civilizations of ancient Greece and Rome, focusing on their political, social, cultural, and philosophical developments. Students will examine the rise of democracy in Athens, the structure and expansion of the Roman Republic and Empire, and the enduring influence of classical art, literature, and thought on modern society. Through analysis of key historical events and primary sources, learners will gain insight into how Greco-Roman ideals shaped Western civilization and continue to inform contemporary institutions and values.

- Evaluate the continuing influence of Greco-Roman civilization on modern culture and institutions.

You should use the results of your Self - Quiz as a guide to go back and review relevant sections of the Reading Assignments. Likewise, the Review Quiz will not count towards your final grade, but should also be used to assist you in a comprehensive review and full understanding of all course material, in preparation for your Final Exam. Lastly, the results of the Graded Quiz will count towards your final grade.
