Course Description

This course introduces students to the core functions and responsibilities of human resource management within contemporary organizations. Topics include strategic HR planning, recruitment and onboarding, employee training and development, performance management, compensation, and employee relations. Emphasis is placed on understanding how HR practices contribute to a positive work environment, ethical decision-making, and organizational effectiveness. Designed for early-stage business students, the course focuses on foundational concepts, workplace applications, and essential skills relevant to entry-level roles in HR or general management.

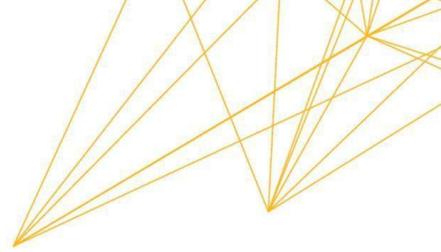

3. Explain the processes of training, development, performance management, and succession planning and their contributions to employee growth and organizational sustainability.
4. Describe coaching, counseling, and termination processes and how ethical and legal considerations guide employee relations.
5. Discuss compensation strategies and employee engagement models as essential tools for retention and performance enhancement.

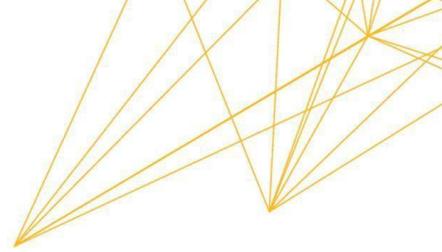
Technology Requirements

- All students are obligated to inform their instructor in advance of any known absences which may result in their non-participation.

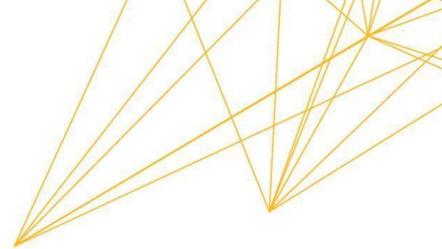

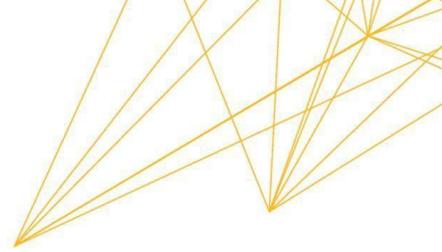

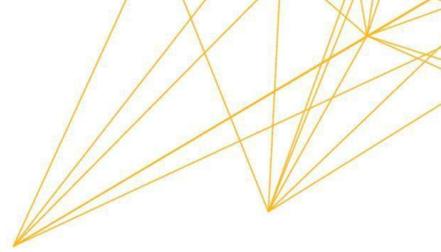
